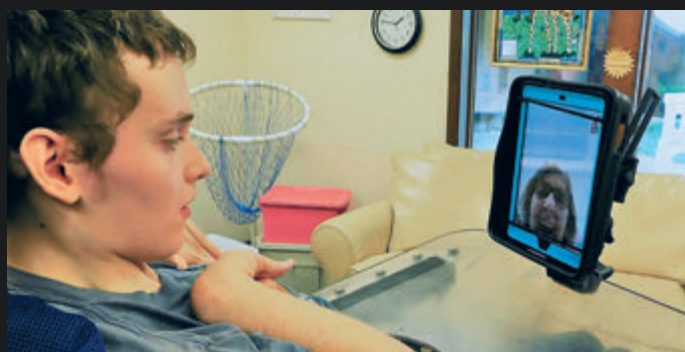
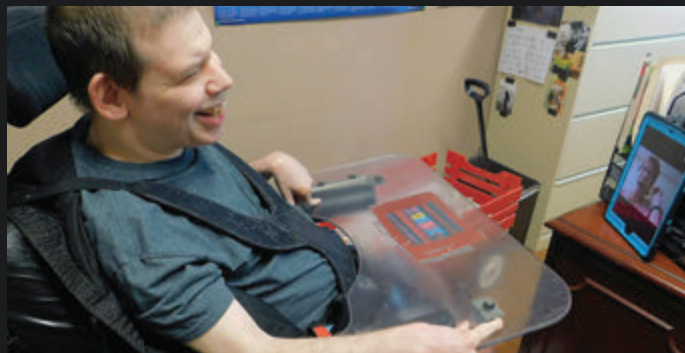

Grant Highlights

Each year Heinzerling Community has specific needs for specialized equipment to assist our residents. New Technology Grant Supports Resident Programming

Heinzerling Community recently was the recipient of a \$10,000 grant from the Good Shepherd Foundation of Ohio. These funds provided our organization with the resources to purchase the TAPit Interactive Platform. This specialized technology equipment will provide our residents with many opportunities for enhanced learning and development. This will include hands-on activities such as virtual art instruction, touch-enabled games, and learning apps, storytelling, switch videos, music instruction, movie nights, and video face-time with loved ones.

This grant support will have a significant impact on Heinzerling residents and open up a whole new world of learning and exploring. In addition, the TAPit will allow our residents to participate in one-on-one video calls with their loved ones. This has become even more important during the Coronavirus pandemic and will make it easier for parents who live far away from Heinzerling Community. We are very grateful to the Good Shepherd Foundation of Ohio for this generous support to assist our residents.

Getting Creative!

Over the last several months, our Activities and Volunteer Departments have worked hard to develop unique and creative ways to deliver our residents' programming. All of our program activities have needed to occur on-site at Heinzerling Community. The Heinzerling Memorial Foundation took advantage of good weather and enjoyed the "Bubble Machine" outside in the courtyards. On rainy days residents had a lot of fun doing artwork and playing drums! For those really hot days we made ice cream from scratch.



The Heinzerling Developmental Center also found ways to make interesting use of our new TAPit for daily programming. They have regularly scheduled virtual classes five days a week utilizing the TAPit and Zoom video platforms. Monday is Dance Party, Tuesday is Game On (we may play Bingo, or Wheel of Fortune or name the sitcom the song is from), Wednesday is Art Class, Thursday is Tai-Chi, and Friday alternates between

Yoga and meditation. In addition to the virtual classes, residents are painting, being read to, doing puzzles, and playing Connect Four, to name a few.

In Memoriam – Dr. Willard Fernald



Heinzerling Community was saddened to learn of the passing of Dr. Willard Fernald in September. Dr. Fernald served as the physician and Medical Director for Heinzerling Community for 56 years and retired in 2016. After meeting founder Otto Heinzerling in 1959, Dr. Fernald became the first Medical Director at Heinzerling Community. Throughout his time at Heinzerling, Dr. Fernald made an indelible mark and significantly impacted many residents and their families.

Staff Nurse Marla Ferguson shares her memories of Dr. Fernald. "I had the pleasure of working alongside Dr. Fernald for fifteen years. There

have only been a few people in my life that I feel have made a lasting impact and helped determine what kind of person I aspire to be. Dr. Fernald was one of those people. With his kind and gentle ways, he served as a mentor to all Heinzerling nursing staff. Dr. Fernald shared his wisdom and life experiences with anyone who showed interest. There was no such thing as a silly question to Dr. Fernald and, we knew he would answer the phone with a happy "hello" regardless of the time.

He showed us through his actions, and with his words, people with profound disabilities are here for a purpose, and all of their lives have meaning. For all of these things, and so much more, Dr. Fernald was a beloved man here at Heinzerling Community. I am forever thankful that my life and career crossed paths with such an amazing man. He was so much more than just a doctor; he was a true leader."

Volunteer Spotlight



For 20 years Heinzerling Community has been blessed to have the local Chapter of the Tzu Chi Foundation volunteer and spend time with our residents. The Buddhist Tzu Chi Foundation is a volunteer-based

international non-governmental organization established by Dharma Master Cheng Yen in Hualien, Taiwan, in 1966. From 30 housewives saving 50 NT cents (approx. US 2 cents) from their grocery budget per day to help those in need, Tzu Chi's footprints of humanitarian aid have now reached 102 countries and regions. The foundation provides community and social services, national and international disaster relief, medical and charitable assistance, education, environmental protection, and a bone marrow donor registry, while promoting humanistic values and community volunteerism.

Tzu Chi USA, the foundation's first chapter outside Taiwan, was established in Alhambra, CA, in 1989. Tzu Chi USA has 66 offices and facilities nationwide, with volunteers and donors striving to make a difference in their communities, serving others unconditionally, and sowing seeds of love and kindness in the Americas.¹

1) How did the Tzu Chi Foundation first hear about Heinzerling Community?

In 1999, Tzu Chi Foundation Columbus service center was established. As a part of our service regiment, we were looking for volunteer opportunities within the community. We researched online the various active community groups and identified Heinzerling Community as one of our key potential partners.

2) Why did the Tzu Chi Foundation choose to volunteer at Heinzerling Community?

Tzu Chi in Chinese is translated into Compassionate Relief. In this spirit, we felt that the work that Heinzerling Community was doing aligned deeply with our values and addressed a critical gap within the Columbus Metro area.

3) How long has your organization volunteered at Heinzerling? How often do you volunteer at Heinzerling Community?

Tzu Chi Foundation has been volunteering with Heinzerling since 2000 and remains actively committed to its residents and community. Every two months, we have groups of volunteers visit the residents at Heinzerling.

4) What does the Tzu Chi Foundation enjoy most about volunteering at Heinzerling Community?

Volunteering at Heinzerling Community is special for our volunteers because it provides direct interactions with residents, all of which have grown to be like a second family to us.

5) What types of activities does your organization do with Heinzerling residents when visiting?

Tzu Chi Foundation supports the activity director's plans with musical performances, arts and crafts activities, bingo, and various board game-related activities, planting vegetables in the gardens and taking residents out for nature walks.

6) What has the Tzu Chi Foundation learned the most from the experience of volunteering at Heinzerling Community?

Heinzerling Community allows our volunteers to be in touch with our own humanity and the interconnected bond we share, while allowing for our volunteers to express their inner love and care for those who, on the outside, are different from them, but within, hold the same desires, emotions, and memories that we do.

7) Why should other organizations consider volunteering at Heinzerling Community?

Heinzerling Community has cultivated a seamless volunteering experience that allows anyone who has a heart to give to find their place in service to Heinzerling Community residents.
